Question 1: Summarize Written Text

Read the passage below and summarize it using one sentence. Type your response in the box at the bottom of the screen. You have 10 minutes to finish this task. Your response will be judged on the quality of your writing and on how well your response presents the key points in the passage.

Vividness of TV and Newspaper :

To understand the final reason why the news marketplace of ideas dominated by television is so different from the one that emerged in the world dominated by the printing press, it is important to distinguish the quality of vividness experienced by television viewers from the “vividness” experienced by readers. I believe that the vividness experienced in the reading of words is automatically modulated by the constant activation of the reasoning centers of the brain that are used in the process of concreting the representation of reality the author has intended. By contrast, the visceral vividness portrayed on television has the capacity to trigger instinctual responses similar to those triggered by reality itself—and without being modulated by logic, reason, and reflective thought. The simulation of reality accomplished in the television medium is so astonishingly vivid and compelling compared with the representations of reality conveyed by printed words that it signifies much more than an incremental change in the way people consume information. Books also convey compelling and vivid representations of reality, of course. But the reader actively participates in the conjuring of the reality the book’s author is attempting to depict. Moreover, the parts of the human brain that are central to the reasoning process are continually activated by the very act of reading printed words: Words are composed of abstract symbols—letters—that have no intrinsic meaning themselves until they are strung together into recognizable sequences.

Sample Answers

Question 1: Summarize Written Text

The lecture focuses on understanding the contrast between a news marketplace of ideas dominated by television and ideas that emerged from the printing press. Question 2: Write Essay

The rising desire to acquire various automobiles for various purposes has expanded dramatically, resulting in increased traffic and confusion on the streets, eventually impacting the global environment. As a result, I believe that individuals should limit their automobile ownership to conserve the environment and switch to more eco-friendly transport. In the following paragraphs, I shall discuss my opinion and give supporting reasons.

Owning a car has become a necessity for many people due to the freedom and comfort it provides on the road. Cars are used every day, but most of us tend to ignore their disadvantages. They pollute the air by burning fossil fuels. Their lights also contribute to light pollution, which has a negative impact on the health of animals, plants, and people. People are unable to exercise due to their dependency on automobiles.

Another significant issue is traffic congestion, which wastes time and energy while on the road. Moreover, drivers should be urged to use the horn only when required. Thus, people can switch to more eco-friendly resorts and engage in automotive research to develop more environmentally friendly automobiles that operate on solar or battery power.

Nevertheless, some individuals argue that producing electric automobiles emits nearly the same amount of CO₂, but you have to include it in the battery manufacture. According to estimates, for every 1 kiloWatt hour (kWh) of battery capacity, 150kg of CO₂ is emitted. As a result, an electric automobile appears to be worse for the environment than a fossil fuel vehicle.

To sum up, car usage should be limited. More efficient steps, such as developing environmentally-friendly vehicles like bicycles and infrastructure, like increasing the number of

roadways, underground tunnels, and parking spaces and encouraging vehicles to follow traffic laws, will improve the environment.
